## Language Toolkit for Infants and Toddlers Who Are Deaf/Hard of Hearing: Empowering Families with Effective Strategies

Language development is crucial for young children's growth, particularly for infants and toddlers who are deaf or hard of hearing.

Rebecca Tucker, an EIS Certificate student and lead D/HH Early Intervention Specialist in Georgia, recently presented a Language Toolkit at last spring's 2025 EHDI Annual Conference in Pittsburg, PA. This toolkit, as part of Rebecca's capstone project, was designed to empower families with effective strategies for fostering language development.

Rebecca consolidated various resources, including academic articles and best practice guidelines, to create a single toolkit containing 10 practical tips, that can be shared with families, agencies and specialists. These tips are designed to be parent-friendly and accessible, for any ages, using simple vocabulary that avoids bias toward any specific communication modality.

This toolkit outlines ten evidence-based strategies to create a language-rich environment and emphasizes the importance of daily interactions. By implementing these key strategies, families can play a pivotal role in enriching their child's language development, ensuring that every child has the opportunity to thrive.

Here are the 10 strategies included in the toolkit:

- 1. **Start Strong: Connect** with your child right away.
- 2. **Share the Focus: Joint Attention**: Engage with what captures your child's attention.
- 3. **Expose Rich Vocabulary**: Use descriptive and varied language.
- 4. Express Naturally & Intentionally: Communicate with purpose.
- 5. **Communicate with Expression**: Use gestures and facial expressions to enhance understanding.
- 6. **Prompt & Pull**: Encourage your child to engage and respond.
- 7. **Take Turns**: Foster conversation through back-and-forth exchanges.
- 8. **Expand & Add**: Build on your child's contributions to enrich language development.
- 9. **Read**: Share stories to promote literacy and language skills.
- 10. **Share Joy**: Celebrate interactions and language use to create a positive learning atmosphere.


This study is for them if they:

- Are a primary caregiver of a deaf or hard of hearing child aged 2 to 12 years, 11 months
- Are 18 years or older and live in the U.S.
- Are fluent in written English and either spoken English or American Sign Language
